Postcode The Great Detective

It's not often that a software program can bring a malicious fraud to light but that's exactly what happened when Gilmex decided to look for some postcoding software.

Gilmex produce and sell a full range of binding and presentation supplies. If you want to keep papers together either temporarily or permanently, they have a solution. Steve Rouse at Gilmex explained, 'we were finding that many couriers labelling and routing systems were dependent on having the correct postcode for the recipient. In many cases our database did not have the correct postcode so we decided to invest in some postcoding software. We saw an AFD advert in Go Direct and decided to call and set them a little test. If they passed we would buy the software. If not. . . .'

Steve selected three company names and addresses totally at random, 1 from his

Road in the UK and even the powerful phonetic search failed to deliver. 'OK' he thought 'its a mistake. I'll ring the number and find out where they really are located.' He rang and was asked 'Which emergency service do you require?' Iain asked for the department which related to the advert only to be told that 'this was an emergency line and would he hang up now, please as genuine emergencies couldn't get through as he was on the line'.

Calling the operator to report that the number seemed to be bogus was the first step. From there Iain called Yellow Pages to say that

'the whole advert was a fraud and would they like to do something about it, especially as the phone number given was that of the emergency services?' After pulling the advert Yellow Pages launched an investigation as to who had placed the advert.

Steve was so impressed at the way in which Postcode Plus had been used to bring this fraud to light that he bought the software. Gilmex are now sending out properly addressed parcels, using a labelling routine that Steve has developed with Postcode Plus. Steve said 'I still can't believe that someone would pay to place an advert which gives a vital emergency number as a phone number. I'm glad that our enquiry about Postcode Plus brought this to light.'

Banking on Postcode

Guinness Mahon is a leading name in the field of leasing and when they wanted to update their computer software they talked to Oyster Bay Systems (01792 473313). Oyster Bay specialise in providing software solutions to the consumer credit and leasing market. A market where correct address information can make the difference to the granting of credit or not.

Oyster Bay built a networked addressing facility for Horsham based Guinness Mahon using Postcode in three different guises – within the UBDOS based 'Fiscal' lease administration package; within 'Prostar, a prospecting system especially developed for and used throughout Guinness Mahon and as a server to the Microsoft Word 6 word processing package. Postcode is used to ensure that address information is standardised across the bank's computer based functions. Michael Breach, who designed the system, said 'we used Postcode as it met the client's needs. We were also impressed with the ability to swiftly modify software to meet the internal requirements of our existing systems.'

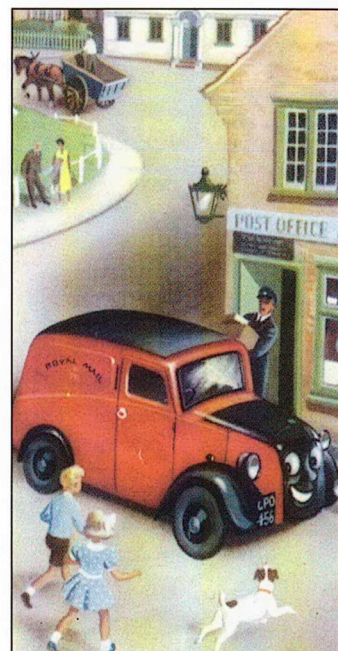

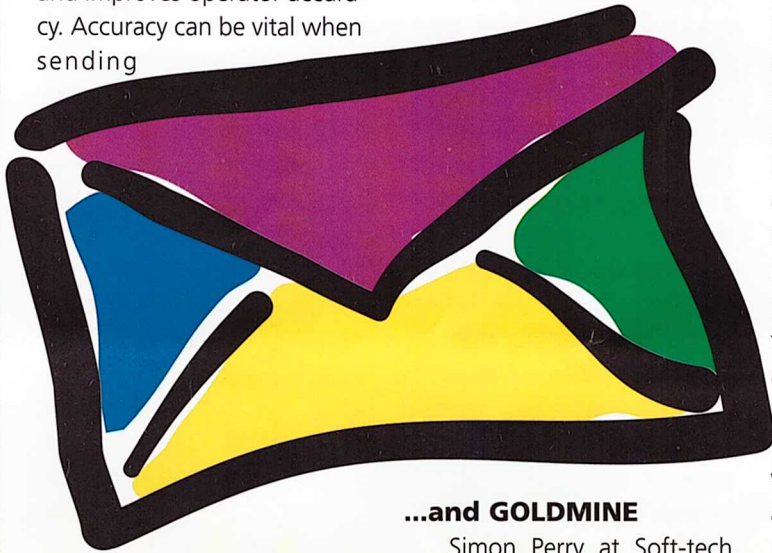

But we mustn't forget Postcode, our original address management program. Kay Ewbank, writing in *Computer Shopper* in October 1995, about the Shareware version from Nildram said *'Finding a full address is a doddle using Postcode – and it can be used alongside a wide variety of databases.'*

'The Shareware version supplies only the town, county and STD code, but is sufficient for you to try out the package to see if it fits in your application. Postcode can be used under DOS or Windows and a UNIX version is now under development'
